"Towards One World" and "Seed of Grace"

Update...



You may recall that editions of the Circuit Newsletter have carried articles about our Towards One World initiative at Trinity, linking with the Seed of Grace project, which our member, Sheila Mukumba, is promoting.

Briefly, Towards One World, which has been running here for an unbelievable forty-one years, is always alert to hear of localised needs, anywhere around the world, and to commit to finance and to

give other support in order to meet those needs.

Seed of Grace is focused on the poverty in which many Methodist ministers in Zimbabwe live and on the huge distances they must travel to fulfil their ministry, often over difficult terrain and with inadequate vehicles.

We launched the latest phase of Towards One World in mid-December 2021, with the target of raising £4000 over two years in order to purchase twenty bicycles and to hand them over to ministers who needed them. I am delighted to tell you that, one year later, we have greatly exceeded expectations and have already bought thirty bicycles! This has been possible as, although the number of supporters at Trinity has dwindled, regular donations have kept coming in and the bicycles became available at a cheaper price than was originally envisaged. Our updated target is now to acquire forty of these by mid-December 2023 and maybe even more!

Sheila is currently with the folk in Zimbabwe and is hoping to do some hands-on work in the distribution of the bicycles. We hope to have a live link-up with her, via Zoom, in one of our coming services. It is planned that she will take over from me as the co-ordinator of Towards One World later this year and, if anyone in the Circuit knows of any need that we might address when this project ends, please get in touch with either Sheila or me to discuss its feasibility.

MAYBE A POSSIBLE AVENUE OF HOPE AND INSPIRATION?

One Christmas more than twenty years ago, the Superintendent Minister Rev. Bernard told our Junior Church an intriguing story about a Candle maker. In essence, it went something like: a man turns up in a run-down depressed area, and after a few misunderstandings with the locals he sets up a small business making candles.

The light from the candles changed the perspective of the environment and people felt safer going around at night, they could look out for one another, and a community spirit was created which decreased problems of substance abuse, loneliness and poverty.

In the fullness of time, other businesses were set up and there was a gradual move to prosperity and a noticeable reduction in crime. The Candle maker sets up apprentices or encourages similar trades to establish in other depressed areas. Finally, there being nothing challenging remaining, the Candle maker mysteriously disappears, leaving the people in a heightened state of confusion and speculation.

Fast forward now to a modern parallel. Here's a picture taken yesterday of a line-up from somewhere in our Circuit of a significant number of generators, which are now on their way to the Ukraine. Alongside these are parcels of inverters which are used to run gas heating systems from a 12v. battery The mains power in many parts of the Ukraine is

often down for 12 to 22 hours a day. This brings a whole new meaning to: In the bleak mid winter. We hope the generators and inverters change the perspective for the places they arrive at.

This year the theme was the Environment and a number of workshops were run during the afternoon, including a tour of the Renewables at the Othona Community, Eco craft activities, a Prayer gallery focussed on environmental issues and a Eucharist service in the Chapel.



The day closed with worship led by Richard Sanders from the Othona community and a message from the Archdeacon of Chelmsford, Elizabeth Snowden about our environmental responsibilities as stewards of God's creation. Accompanied by a Worship band led by Rev Dan Pierce.

Are you warm enough??

As the restrictions for Covid have been gently eased -the weather had dominated our attention with the extreme hot dry weather earlier – almost drought conditions, then the rains, and now in December the very cold, icy and frosty days. This together with the pressures of the rising in the general cost of living brings with it the concerns, especially for the elderly, the lonely and vulnerable – having difficulty in coping. Sadly there are many who are faced with the problem of **"Heat or Eat"?**

Organisations and churches, are being urged to find ways of at least providing a "Warm place" - where people can meet in the warmth and to share socially.

With this in mind , at Moulsham volunteers have established our *"Thermal Thursdays* each Thursday through to the end of February This will extend the usual Coffee Morning now from 10.00 am 'till 4 pm offering coffee , refreshments, even light lunches and the chance to chat and maybe share in table games, some art and crafts – and just 'to be' - in the warmth.

Otherwise the year has been quite busy as meetings and organisations get back together again after the Covid 'lockdowns'. The Boys & Girls Brigades are now meeting as usual, and thanks are due to the leaders for keeping in touch with their members through zoom, and outside gatherings during lockdowns.

Our Tuesday afternoon Bible studies have met on alternate weeks now followed by the weekly Advent Course themed around the famous hymn *"O Come, O Come Emmanuel* led by Glenda Griffin and shared with friends from St. Lukes

In October for our Harvest Thanksgiving we celebrated the rededication of the Brigades and the work of th**e Baby Basics team.** At the end of November we shared with other Chelmsford Methodist churches in the Advent Carol Service at Trinity.

Our **Annual Gift Service** on 4th. December was in aid of Food Bank, and led by Sue Johnson where she explained something of how the Warehouse and distribution centres work – we saw an excellent video of the work inside the very busy Beehive Lane warehouse. Sue said that it is through peoples' generosity that Foodbank is able to help those in need, not just at Christmas, but throughout the year.

The day that our dear friend Rosemary Smith died was a bittersweet time for us all. A time not only to give thanks for the countless many lives she'd blessed & touched during the course of her, 'prayer based,' ministry @ Sible Hedingham Baptist Fellowship, where I was a fledgling member but also a time to reflect on the spiritual vacuum left behind in the wake of her death & how & by whom that vacuum might be filled?

Of course, we need not have concerned ourselves unduly, since true spiritual investment, in due course, always reaps a rich return. I.e., Followers becoming leaders in their own right, thus ensuring Rosemary's legacy of loving encouragement & faith filled, godly counsel, continue to live on. Why am I telling you this? Because a few days before she died, Rosemary sent us a postcard, which we didn't receive until the day after her death. On the back of the postcard, she reflected on how, 'happy she was, in Jesus,' despite being terminally ill. On the front of the postcard was a picture of an open field, a few sheep dotted about the place & in the bottom right-hand corner, the words, **'the Lord will provide.'** A direct quote from Genesis 50:22 which references the moment when Joseph, now governor of the whole of Egypt, comes face to face with his family & in love & forgiveness, rescues them, completely, from the crippling plight of their material circumstances.

The card, still housed in the original picture frame in which we placed it, over forty years ago, is a continuing reminder of God's love & faithfulness throughout the years. I.e., His promise to provide @ every stage of our lives, come what may. His assurance that, with this particular Good Shepherd @ the helm of our lives, we really will want for nothing!

The Essex Course in Spiritual Direction: September 2023-June 2025

Spiritual Direction is a one-to-one ministry of prayer and listening. The Essex Course in Spiritual Direction (previously known as the Pleshey Course) has run for over thirty years and provides the core skills and experience to prepare participants to offer the ministry of Spiritual Direction or some form of Christian accompaniment in their various contexts. This is an experiential course which runs over two academic years and consists of regular Thursday evening online sessions on Zoom with nine course days and two retreat days held on Saturdays at The Schoolroom and Chapel, Woodham Ferrers, near Chelmsford. The course will help participants to grow in spiritual depth as they engage with others and discover more of their own journey with God. It is designed for mature Christians who already have experience of receiving some form of Spiritual Direction or accompaniment and who wish to explore and discern God's call to offer this valuable ministry to others. Alongside online and in-person sessions, material will be provided for personal reflection and prayer.

Most people who successfully complete the course go on to offer one-to-one accompaniment, but the art of Spiritual Direction and its practice of deep prayerful listening can impact many other aspects of a person's life and calling, such as traditional church ministry, pioneering and church planting, chaplaincy, missional activities, facilitating small groups, prayer ministry and pastoral care, as well as deepening one's own spiritual life.

Applications are now open and close on **Friday March 17th, 2023.** Please visit our Contacts page for details of how to request an application form. The course is for both lay and ordained people.

AN ECUMENICAL COURSE

The course is offered on behalf of the Essex and East London ecumenical network for Spiritual Direction and after successful completion of the course participants are eligible to be added to the network's list of Spiritual Directors. The course is recognised by the Anglican and Catholic dioceses in Essex and the Baptist and Methodist regional leadership. Both the members of the Core Group and the participants on the course have always come from a variety of Christian denominations and traditions.



Reminiscences of a Methodist preacher 12: Approaching a conclusion

At the Ministerial Synod of the London North-East District 2001 I asked for - and was granted - permission to "sit down" from active Circuit ministry. This was a year earlier than had been anticipated when I had been invited to the Waltham Forest Circuit in 1997, but the timing was right both for the Circuit (which was considering how to reduce its costs) and for family reasons. Our daughter's relationship had ended, leaving her with two young sons and no home. We took



our grandsons (one of primary age, the other in early years) into the manse. They attended school in South Chingford until their mother could find a new home. She was accepted on the Housing List of Braintree District Council and was eventually offered social housing. The boys stayed with us while this was being resolved. In 2001 Pam and I were able to move back to Braintree, to our present home, not far from the new home of our daughter and grandsons. Once again we were blessed through the experience of a timely resolution of a difficult situation.

But was this move to be retirement? Or a call to new ways of serving? In my 7th Reminiscence I quoted the Yiddish saying "Der mentsh trakht und Gott lakht" ("Man plans and God laughs"). Before 6 months of "retirement" had passed, I received a phone call from the District Chair. The Colchester Circuit had ministerial staff problems through ill health and a lack of active supernumeraries. Would I be willing to meet the Circuit Stewards to consider in what ways I could offer some part-time support? As a result, I was to assist the Colchester Circuit pastorally for two days a week in addition to Plan appointments. The last act of worship I led in that Circuit was at Castle Methodist Church on June 28th, 2015, the text being Mark 5:34, the healing of the woman who touched the hem of Christ's cloak. We too can be part of that hem.

But as if that were not enough, I was led to two other areas of service. The first was with the Essex Churches Council for Industry and Commerce, as lead chaplain for Workplace Chaplaincy in Braintree. Once again, my previous experiences of industry and commerce were being combined with my experience of ministry. My particular role was as chaplain to the staff of Braintree District Council (BDC), which I continued for several years until, as I approached my mid 70's, I was beginning to find it too much for me. I was able to "pass the baton" to Father Tim Barnes, priest at St. Peters in the Fields, Bocking.

Another area of service developed from an initiative of Braintree District Council in 2009, which expressed a preference for having a single point of contact for seeking the views of Faith groups. As a result of a meeting held at Causeway House (the offices of BDC), Braintree District Interfaith Forum was established. The inaugural General Meeting was on June 8th, 2010, attended by 26 people representing the Baha'i, Christian, Hindu, Muslim and Sikh faiths. I became secretary of B-Diff in 2012.



In the same way that I had felt that God had called me to be actively involved in ecumenical relationships between churches, I now recalled the longing stirred in me during ordination training to know more about other faiths and those who live by them. A Sikh school

teacher had shared with us students what her faith meant to her and how it influenced her work as a teacher. I felt challenged - could I describe my faith as being as meaningful to me as her faith is to her? On another occasion we students were taken to a Buddhist Monastery for a time of challenging questions and discussion with the abbot. During my active Circuit ministry, I had little opportunity to explore relationships between faiths until my time in South Chingford (Waltham Forest Circuit 1997-2001). One day I received a phone call from a man who asked, "Would my wife be allowed to come to South Chingford Methodist Church for services?". Clearly there was a story behind the question. I replied "Of course; she would be very welcome. May I visit you both?" He asked another question: "Would I be allowed to come with her?" I said "Of course: you would both be made very welcome". A pause followed before he said "We have recently settled here from Sierra Leone. She was a Methodist there – but I am a Muslim". I visited them, and they were made very welcome by the congregation. She became a member of the church; he made it clear he remained a Muslim, while deeply grateful for the welcome they had both received. We shared many interesting exchanges.

And so it was that in 2010 I gladly embraced the opportunity to be actively involved in the Interfaith movement. At no time since have I found my Christian faith being weakened. Instead, as I shared with others what I have experienced and what I believe has been God's call to me, and as I have listened to friends of other faiths speak of their experiences and convictions, I have become certain that God's love for his creation and for humanity is wider than any of us can ever begin to comprehend. The barriers that separate us are not God's barriers.

Of course, I have been challenged - Scripture has been quoted to me, particularly the words of John's Gospel ch.14 v6, to make it clear how wrong I am. But I recall how often in the Gospels we find Jesus warmly welcoming those whose backgrounds differed from his. The parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:25-37) is a powerful example of Jesus holding such a person before others as an example to follow. Are the words of John 14:6 meant as a dire warning - or as a beautiful promise? During the summer of 2022, during a shopping trip to Chelmsford, I took the opportunity to sit quietly in Chelmsford Cathedral, as I had often done during lunch breaks many years before while working at Marconi's in New Street. As I watched many people walk quietly through the Cathedral (people of varying nationalities and perhaps of various faiths or no faith), I saw the spectrum of light from stained glass windows falling on all of them. The thought came to me -"Who am I to judge who is or is not beloved of God?". I remembered walking in a busy London shopping street many years before, when a bus went past which carried an advertisement for Christian Radio: "God is on our side". What might those words mean to the many different people on the pavement around me? Did they mean "God is on OUR side - the side that holds the same understanding as us", or was it an all-embracing welcome -God reaches out to ALL? Then another memory came to me from my time as a minister in the London Forest Circuit. Efforts were being made to revive the lapsed practice of a united Good Friday Walk of Witness. I visited a minister of a well-established free church denomination to invite him and his congregation to take part. He left me in no doubt that he had no intention of sharing in anything which involved Methodists, because of our heretical non-scriptural Arminian views of human free-will, denying the total sovereignty of God. He would strongly discourage his congregation from any involvement. Was that a barrier which God has erected?

This will be the last of my series of Reminiscences. If you have read them all, I hope you have found some value within them as I have tried to express the ways in which I have felt, and still feel, that God has been guiding me in all the experiences of a life which is now approaching the upper 80's. I end with the words of a verse from a hymn by Frederick William Faber (STF416; H&P230), words which have encouraged me for many years:

For the love of God is broader than the measure of the mind; and the heart of the eternal is most wonderfully kind.

Methodist success in Eco Church Awards

More Methodist churches are signing up to be part of the Eco Church award scheme operated by A Rocha UK.

Participation in the Eco Church awards for the 12 months until June 2022 shows an increase of 70 percent for Methodist Churches over the previous year. In that period, 94 churches achieved a Bronze award, 28 churches achieved a Silver award and one the Methodist / URC Emmanuel Church in I



achieved a Silver award and one, the Methodist / URC Emmanuel Church in Bungay in the East Anglia District, received a Gold award.

There are now more than 640 Methodist and LEP churches registered for Eco Church, with four churches having achieved Gold.

The Eco Church award scheme is a national community of churches from all denominations addressing the environmental crisis, using a common framework, an online toolkit of resources and the award survey, as well as learning and speaking up together.

Three award levels of Bronze, Silver and Gold encourage churches to engage more deeply with the environment within worship and teaching, buildings and land management, community and global engagement and lifestyle. The awards are not an end, but a means to help churches embed caring for creation across every area of church life.

Jude Levermore, Head of Mission at the Methodist Church, commented, "Living sustainably is an essential part of our calling, which we are living out in the context of a global climate emergency. The Methodist Conference has committed our Church to achieve net-zero emissions by 2030 and the increasing number of Gold and Silver Eco churches are leading the way. It is great to see how Eco Church is inspiring action in our churches and bringing people together. Eco Church will be an important part of the Methodist 'Hope in Action' agenda over the coming years."

The Bristol District is the first district to have been awarded an Eco District Bronze award. This has been achieved with various initiatives, including churches setting a baseline for their carbon footprints, using the land around buildings to benefit the environment and engaging with political action to protect and restore the planet. There has also been a dramatic reduction in district business mileage from 250,000 miles a year to around 70,000.

Jonathan Pye, Chair of Bristol District, commented, "We are delighted that the Bristol Methodist District, led by our Bristol Eco District Team, is the first Methodist district to gain a national bronze Eco District Award.

"The Bristol Methodist District is committed to living responsibly by ecological principles. We want to encourage individuals, churches and Circuits, and the District as a whole, to respond in appropriate ways to the ongoing climate emergency. We not only seek to achieve our own netzero carbon targets, in line with the Methodist Conference but set an example to others in wider society to do so, too."

Helen Stephens, Church Relations Manager from A Rocha UK, commented; "Awareness of the deepening climate and biodiversity crises has been brought into searing focus by the summer heatwave, but together, the Methodist Church and A Rocha UK's Eco Church programme offer a hopeful way to respond to the environmental crisis.

"There is something each one of us can do to help change the course that we're on. And it needs every one of us to do something. If we want to grow future generations in our churches, then the environment is one of the biggest priorities on which they want to see action.





Our Circuit ECO journey so far

There is no doubt climate change has become the most important issue facing our planet and the clock is ticking. As a Circuit we have committed to playing our part in helping to slow down the rising temperatures because we believe it is what God is calling us to do as stewards of creation. A recent Tear Fund survey conducted amongst young people in churches discovered that 9 out of 10 young people surveyed were concerned about climate change but only 1 in 10 believe their church is doing enough about it. If it matters to our young people - it should matter to all of us.

We are making progress. The Circuit has appointed a Circuit Steward with responsibility for ECO issues (me!).

We currently have

3 churches with Bronze Awards : Broomfield, Moulsham Lodge and Trinity and 3 churches that have registered and are working towards their Bronze Award : Maldon, St Augustines Springfield and South Woodham Ferrers.

We are also working towards the Circuit ECO church award and hope to be able to apply for that in the next year. Awards are only the beginning and we need to ensure that we don't sit back and rest on our laurels but keep finding new ways to keep 1.5 alive.

On a personal note, some of you may remember that at the beginning of 2022 I started to crochet a temperature blanket. Different temperatures were assigned different colours and I crocheted a row each day. Some of you have asked how the blanket is looking. The blanket stopped abruptly in July. We hit temperatures of 40 degrees and this had a great impact on me. I had taken on this project without really thinking about what I was doing. I edged the day my granddaughter was born in April with gold. I enjoyed taking notice of the temperatures and choosing the colours each day. But when 40 degrees hit I knew that I could not continue. I had a reality check. This project had become a record of what felt like our failure to prevent a climate catastrophe. I don't know whether the project will ever be finished but I do know that we must never stop trying to save our planet.
