

# The Work of God Chelmsford Circuit

A report from each church. September 2019

## **BROOMFIELD.**

We continue to reach out to families in Broomfield and beyond through Messy Church. Between 15 and 20 families join us once a month for food, games, craft activities, songs and prayer, based on a theme and a bible-based story. The families enjoy their time with us and, we often, have the joy of welcoming a new family to the church. Some families are very regular in their attendance and others more intermittent. Like all Messy Churches, around the country we are concerned about how we can encourage families to become more committed disciples of Jesus.

Last year we ventured into opening the church on a Thursday evening to PAC, (Pizza at church club) club for children in their last year at primary school an older. We have two very regular attenders, whose confidence has blossomed as they have shared their experiences at school and beyond. Other young folk have been and gone but we are giving it another try in the hope that we can attract more young adolescents to join us. We will review our position at Christmas, and we ask you to pray for this venture, that God will guide us in our decision making.

A new venture for this September is a Film Club which will meet on the last Sunday evening of each month. The first meeting will be on Sunday 29<sup>th</sup> September at 7:30pm where the film, "The Hiding Place", the story of Corrie Ten Boom, will be shown and refreshments will be provided. We are hoping that this will be an excellent opportunity for members to invite guests to join them. We would welcome our friends in the circuit to come along and for churches to advertise this in their notices and newsletters.

We are hoping to arrange a meeting soon with our Anglican friends to see if we can hold a candlelight procession through the village on Saturday December 14<sup>th</sup> followed by a festive service and refreshments. Along the route the children had to find the names of seven angels displayed in windows along the route, the initial letters of which spelled the name Gabriel. When they handed in their completed sheet at the end of the procession each child was given their own angel, which had been knitted by a dedicated team of ladies from the church. It was great to see people from the houses along the route open their doors and join in with the carol singing. We have held two of these ventures successfully but, sadly, last year we had to call off the procession because of heavy rain. We hope for more clement weather this year!!

# **GREAT NOTLEY**

The Church in Great Notley (LEP) is pleased to have welcomed new members and attenders during the past year, as well as having conducted several baptisms. Our longstanding regular activities for various

age-groups continue to be successful and well-attended both by those who come to our services and those from our local community: the monthly Men's Breakfast, Friendship Club lunch for older people, and Women Together social group. In addition to our longstanding activities for children and families, led by our Schools & Community Worker and our Children & Family Worker: Weekly Snackanory for parents & toddlers and

fter-School Club, monthly Youth Group and Saturday Messy Church, lunch clubs and assemblies held in two local primary schools, an Easter Experience for local schools and a Summer holiday club week, we have started some new ventures this past year: a monthly social group for women, which is attended mainly by the younger mothers who are attached to the church or to our family community activities, a monthly welcome event for people who are new to the area and a monthly "Who let the dads out?" activity morning for fathers and their children. Last but not least, after an extensive period of planning and training in association with the Trussell Trust, we are very much looking forward to opening as a weekly Foodbank this Autumn and to serving the community in this way.

## HALL STREET

Hall Street Methodist Church was built over 150 years ago and originally was a Primitive Methodist Church like many others of it's time having only the bare essentials in it's make up. Later on a school room was added along with in later years good kitchen facilities. In the past it has had some very good and high times. The current membership stands at 11 but has that unusual situation where the Sunday morning attendance is usually a bit higher than the actual membership. Although the congregation is largely getting on in years a little the music and singing is pretty remarkable. Katie our pianist is quite brilliant and the ability to do descants etc. is very much part of Sunday worship. On Thursday's we have alternating Bible Study and Fellowship in the afternoon.

As well as ourselves there are a number of other churches and organisations that meet on our premises. The Presbyterian Church. Two churches from Ghana. A Writer's Group. An Alcoholic's Anonymous group are among those that have regular meetings.

As to the future.....we look forward to continuing to welcome new people and those that need to find a spiritual home and all the blessing that it brings. Some of us are also actively involved in bringing other events to the circuit and to the wider Christian Church locally and in wider parts of Essex.

On the first and third Sunday of the month we run a intergenerational, interactive service with modern worship and refreshments as part of the service.

#### Knitting and creative crafts.

Every Tuesday Morning for 2 hours, aimed at all ages.

# St. Augustine of Canterbury LEP, North Springfield

#### **Our Mission**

Since Spring of 2018 a vacancy has existed in relation to ordained Anglican ministry and, of necessity because of limited resources, ministerial input from the Methodist Church has been restricted. The Church Council, given these circumstances and with a small congregation, decided for four weeks during November and December 2018 to devote time as part of our morning worship to reflect prayerfully on ourselves, where we are now, the journey that God wants to embark upon and the kind of ministries that we needed for our journey. These congregational discussions resulted in our being able to determine where we wish St. Augustine's to travel. The aims of our mission are set out below.

To maintain our ecumenical, inclusive character and our openness to progressive theology and thinking. We are members of 'inclusive church' and strive to welcome and serve all people and not to discriminate on grounds of economic power, gender, mental health, physical ability, race or sexuality. We continue to host monthly meetings of the Chelmsford group of the Progressive Christian Network.

To build our connections with (and relevance to) our community

High on the list of priorities given our ecumenical character is to seize the opportunities that exist. There are two local primary schools, the Bishops School opposite the church with which we work closely and Springfield Primary School with which we have little contact currently. We need to develop our capability to provide pastoral care, outreach and social events and to develop further Messy Church and to discover news and innovative ways of engaging with our community such as flexible approaches to worship in terms of time, place and style.

To develop and nurture our members and their ministries and strengthen further the church community and organisation.

There is a need for strong ordained and lay leadership linked to our sense of purpose and calling. There is a strong desire to see us organising the Church community and our life together creating spaces to 'be' together as well as to 'do' together. Prayer and study groups should be reinvigorated.

To work in collaboration with others and grasp opportunities to partner with others especially in the rapidly growing Beaulieu Park nearby.

As models of ministry change new relationships between parishes and churches and new forms of ministry emerge and there is great opportunity to develop creative, collaborative ministries. St Augustine's on the Anglican side is a partner in the North Chelmsford Mission and Ministry Partnership. Relationships with other churches in the NCMMP are strong and we would like to develop that within the Methodist circuit.

## SOUTH WOODHAM FERRERS

We started a monthly memory worship service in September 2018. this has continued on the third Monday of every month. I am delighted to report that it has become increasingly well attended and has proved to be an invaluable mission opportunity. Memory worship will continue for 2019/2020.

"Would you Adam and Eve it?" A play put on by the Bible Society one evening in the local secondary school in the town was organised by a member of our church and sponsored by the Christian Council in the town. It was an opportunity for mission in the town. Over 100 people attended but mostly by church folk so perhaps not the mission opportunity we had hoped for but nevertheless a successful and enjoyable evening.

Harvest Festival service in September 2018 was a joint service with our Anglican friends. Our gifts (including money) were taken to CHESS in Chelmsford. (Charity for the Homeless in the Chelmsford area)

Town carol service organised by our church included involving the local schools.

"Brew Saturday" in February to raise money and awareness for the Samaritans.

A course "Talk for Jesus" ran for 6 weeks from February to April led by Rev Barry. It was quite well attended and offered practical ideas to spread God's Word.

Palm Sunday service held outside in the square beside our church.

Good Friday Walk of Witness

Cup cake day and plant sale one Saturday in June to raise money for Alzheimers.

"Open the book" project begins in Trinity St Marys school in September with a view to taking it to other schools in the town after Christmas. This project is a Bible Society initiative and presents bible stories on a regular basis to the children in school.

#### Regular Activities

Foodbank - church members help with this weekly and regularly donate food.

Weekly prayer group

Retiring collections for disaster funds as appropriate eg Indonesia Disaster appeal October 2018

Action for Children Collecting boxes and advent appeal.

Regular donations to "Chatty Bus" - offers teenagers in the community an opportunity to have a drink and a chat every Friday evening.

<u>Tithe committee</u> - we regularly financially support local ventures . This year this has included a donation to CHESS, Donation to St Peter's cafe in Maldon to pay for cleaning in order for the cafe (which supports those in need in the local community) to stay open, Donation to a disabled child in the community to provide a mobile hoist,

We regularly support PARC (play and resource centre in Braintree or children with disabilities)

We have 3 main organisational / planning groups 1) Finance & Property 2) Worship & Nurture 3) Outreach & Fellowship - plus a Pastoral group leader with approximately 26 Pastoral Visitors. Representatives of the above groups link into the Church Council. Functions and activities are supported by Church Stewards, Communion Stewards, Property Stewards, organisers of Church flowers and their distribution, Coffee shop and Catering providers, Treasurer plus an Envelope + Gift Aid Secretary, First Steps Secretary plus Premises Booking and office staff supporting the provision of Trinity News, weekly notices and our Web Site.

Trinity Directory's initial pages give clear indication of contact names for many of the above, plus link people for activities which regularly take place at Trinity e.g.

<u>For Adults</u> - Choir, Christian Aid plus Christian Aid hunger lunches, Circuit Women's luncheon club, 5 House Groups, Ladies Group, Women's Fellowship, Men's supper group, Singles lunches, Towards One World Project (Ethiopia), Trinity Care Group, MWiB (Methodist Women in Britain), Bowls Club, Music & Drama Fellowship, Action for Children & donation boxes,

We also participate in local activities / projects e.g. Chelmsford foodbank, Christians Together in Chelmsford, Covenant activities with The Cathedral and Church of the Ascension, 4Families lunches (school holidays) plus clothing collection and delivery for Whitechapel Mission.
