Easter Offering 2025

In the afternoon of Sunday 18th May **our Circuit** held its **Easter Offering Service** at Witham Methodist Church. It was a lovely service primarily written by Ruth Parrott, Methodist Women in Britain, Co-Chair (Northern Section), assisted by the Easter Offering Task Group. This year's theme was "Education for All, Hope for All", and the service explored how education transforms lives and communities.

The Easter Offering 2025 service focused on every person's right to education and the order of service contained stories telling of people who are committed to changing lives through education.

Education for All, Hope for All offered Churches, Circuits and Districts a moment to consider how education transforms lives and communities and opening God's promise of hope and fullness of life for all people. The order of service also included the dedication of the Easter Offering donated by Local Churches to the World Mission Fund, which works with over a hundred of the Methodist Church in Britain's Partner Churches and organisations around the world.

Our Circuit Easter Offering service was led by Val Carter. In place of the usual reflection, Val was invited to lead a Bible Study based on the Gospel reading. She led us in an interesting new look at the Mary and Martha story. Representatives from Moulsham Lodge, Maldon, South Woodham Ferrers, Witham and Halstead shared in the reading of the Bible passages and the Stories set out in the order of service. An intergenerational Group, from Witham, which included children, led the Dramatized Reading. Maureen and 'Femi led the prayers. The Easter Offering donations from the some of our Circuit Churches were thankfully received and dedicated. **The total amount raised was £1011.66**.

Sadly, the Service was not as well attended as we had hoped but those who came enjoyed the service and there was a time for further fellowship around tables in the Foyer with delicious cakes and tea.

CTIW Easter Holiday Children's Activity Club

The Holiday Club took place on three mornings in Holy Week at Witham Methodist Church.

The programme each day included ice breaker games, songs, Bible lessons, drama, a craft activity and the all -important snack time. Each day the children learnt and recited the memory verse - Revelation 1: 5 and 6, which brought all three days together.



The theme for the first day was Palm Sunday. The children learnt the King of Kings/ Glory/Halleluia song and made palm leaves. We then re-enacted Jesus' entry into Jerusalem, singing, laying down our 'cloaks' and waving our palm leaves.

Day 2 was more solemn as we focused on Good Friday; the garden of Gethsemane, the trial of Jesus and the Crucifixion. The children made crosses from modelling clay, decorated with beads.





On Day 3 the theme was Easter Sunday and the empty tomb. The children made Resurrection Rolls from croissant dough surrounding a marshmallow. When these were cooked, the marshmallow had melted leaving a hole in the middle- a memorable way to represent the empty tomb.

We finished with a quiz from Revd Howard to remind the children of what they had learnt over the 3 days.

There was a total of 23 children registered with an average of 16 children present at each session as a few children could not attend on certain days.

Grateful thanks go out to Revd 'Femi, Revd Howard and the team of helpers from Witham Methodist and St Nicolas churches.

We look forward to another Holiday Club in August.

After the act of witness we were warmly invited to the Roman Catholic church for tea/coffee and hot cross

buns. This was also a lovely time of sharing Christian fellowship. Many thanks to all who served refreshments.

St. Nicolas church printed 60 Order of Service/hymns sheets and they were all used. We had about 65 people at my count, which was slightly up on the previous year. What is unconscious bias?

'Unconscious bias refers to a bias of which we are unaware and which happens outside of our control. It is a bias that happens automatically and is triggered by our brain making quick



judgments and assessments of people and situations, influenced by our background, cultural environment and personal experiences.'

Hidden biases have the power to undermine and derail our desire to act justly, and fairly towards other people and lots of areas in our decision making. eg, when it comes to recruitment, promotion, and openness to new sources of ideas. It is possible to be unconsciously biased regarding disability, religion, race, gender, age, social class, and more.

We will be using the video resources for introducing unconscious bias which is now available on the Methodist Church Website.

The online session will include watching the videos and joining in small group conversation/reflection following each of the 3 video clips.

Myriad Commissioning

I wonder if anyone can remember an item I wrote for the Circuit newsletter in June 2023? I wrote about our Spring Harvest experiences, and especially about some workshops we attended called 'Can anyone start a new church?' In my item I said 'watch this space' – and now feel guilty for any breath-holding I may be responsible for!! Sorry for no regular posts – but here is an update.

Following our Spring Harvest experience in 2023 Eddie and I signed up to lead a team within the Myriad church planting and growth programme and we have been participating for the past 2 years. <u>https://ccx.org.uk/myriad-pathway/</u>

We have attended 6-monthly, two-day gatherings and at the first one we were encouraged to recruit additional team members. We were delighted when Jeff, John and Jenny joined our team. We have been supported by the Myriad team and other participants, we have attended other events, have had sessions with a Myriad mentor and our own team meetings during which we have encouraged one another and come up with ideas to fulfil our Myriad vision 'to shine the light of Jesus in Hatfield Peverel and to make disciples'.

Shining the light of Jesus in the village creates some challenges with no physical building and therefore no focus for folk to even know we are there, never mind

Folk are beginning to recognise who we are and why we are there on a

As encouraged at Spring Harvest, we have read 'the Church of Tomorrow' by John McGinley and found its contents very inspirational. It reminded us to be church where people are, and to find our own opportunities locally. Myriad taught us about being more open to the prompting of the Holy Spirit, as well as introducing us to 'Discovery Bible Study' which has provided a great alternative worship solution. Our worship, fellowship and community life have also been enriched.

We will continue the Schools Ministry in St Andrews Junior School, started in 2019 by Barry and Sandie Hulbert and so ably continued by Ria. We will be prayerfully considering the best way to progress this and, in the meantime, I have agreed to be a School Governor to ensure the closest possible connection with the school. We are also building relationships with St Andrews Church in the village, looking forward to opportunities to work together in projects locally.

My Stitch to Enrich group continues to meet in the Community Café twice a month – 4 years on we have a regular group who meet to chat, with stitching always optional! We have had significant success in the handicraft classes of the **Horticultural Society Spring and Autumn Shows** and also arrange craft activity sessions on a Sunday at Christmas and Easter. In September we will again celebrate **Harvest** with a workshop of ideas for recycled creations, a 'harvest' of things we would otherwise throw away, with the opportunity to enter our results into that class at the Autumn Show.

As a bereavement volunteer for Farleigh Hospice, I have recently started to lead a Bereavement Help Point in the Community Café – another connection with the village and its people. *In December our church members were invited to sing carols in the pub and in the café* and had a Christmas tree in the café entrance, for folk to include tags with their messages and prayer requests, with their prayers included in our worship.

Of course, we would love to welcome additional worshippers on a Sunday. We believe that we will, in God's time. This photo shows our commissioning service at our final Myriad Gathering in May. After the presentation, the Myriad team members and members of other participating teams prayed over us. During their prayers of encouragement, they recognised our commitment, observing that we were 'salty' people and full of light, commenting that we are a force to be reckoned with! They said our actions were conspicuous and commended us for our commitment and willingness to step out to make a difference.

I thank God that he prompted me to explore this great opportunity, that he ensured that I didn't let it go, and that the inspiration continues, even if the Myriad programme

has reached its conclusion. I would be happy to share any aspect of the programme and how we have benefited with anyone interested.

Methodist Women in Britain

Revd Charity Tozivepi-Nzegwu

Friends, this afternoon, I stood before this panel in Elv Cathedral with my two friends, Jennie and Gill, and I was utterly gobsmacked. Here, stitched in vivid colour, was the creation story, but not as we so often see it, through the narrowing lens of European art and imagination. No. Here was a scene that stopped me in my tracks, invited me to linger, and whispered truths my spirit has long known.

At the centre of the garden, not hidden behind leaves of shame, sit Adam and Eve. But look again, Adam is a Black man, richly dark, adorned with beautiful dreadlocks. Eve is a white



woman, her hair flowing red like fire. Together they are not only at ease with each other but at home among the creatures of the earth, giraffe, elephant, leopard, zebra, birds, insects, creatures of the water. A lemur leans towards them. The river beneath their feet pulses with life. Creation sings its song of interdependence.

I had never imagined Adam and Eve in this way. Yet how right this is. How faithful. How urgent.

For too long, Christian imagination, shaped by colonial power, by racial supremacy, by an impoverished theology, has rendered the first humans as white, and whiteness as somehow closest to divinity. We must tell the truth, this is a lie. A lie that has wounded, marginalised, and distorted the gospel.

This panel speaks a different word. It bears prophetic witness, the image of God is not confined to one skin, one hair texture, one body. The image of God is Black. The image of God is white. The image of God is brown, Asian, Indigenous. The image of

God is dreadlocked, beaded, braided, shaved, curly, straight, or coiled. The image of God is expansive. It always has been.

This matters, not only in art, but in how we live, worship, and structure our communities. I speak as a woman of African heritage who has carried too many stories of erasure and exclusion. I speak also as one shaped by the gospel's relentless call to justice.

This panel reminded me again, we must decolonise our sacred imagination. We must refuse to perpetuate images of creation, or of the body of Christ, that silence the many faces and voices of humanity. The work of justice begins with truth telling. It begins with vision, with seeing rightly.

I saw rightly here. In this embroidered garden, I saw an Adam who looks like my brothers, my uncles, my cousins. I saw an Eve who might be my neighbour, my friend. I saw not dominance or hierarchy, but shared life, a foretaste of the reconciliation we are called to pursue.

I wept, for the beauty of it, and for society's long failure to show such beauty. Yet I left that panel not in despair but in hope. Every stitch proclaimed, it is still possible to reimagine. It is still possible to live into the wideness of God's grace.

This is the kind of art that fuels the work of justice. It is art that says to every Black child, every child of colour, you were there from the beginning. You are not an afterthought. You bear the image of the Creator.

It is art that says to the church, stop clinging to narrow visions. The garden is vast. The body of Christ is richly woven. The river still flows.

I will carry this vision with me, into my leadership, into my writing, into my preaching, into the corridors where I advocate for justice within my church tradition.

May we have the courage to live as though this creation story is true. Because it is.

May we keep stitching together a world where every person can know they belong, fully, freely, gloriously, in the garden of God.
