Sermon Lk 5:1-11

Intro/

'So they pulled their boats up on shore, left <u>everything</u> – and followed Him.' Lk 5:11

Why did they do that? – What's been going on that's brought them to this momentous decision? What's it all about?

We need to go back a bit I think – perhaps a year – and then perhaps we'll begin to see how something that <u>looks</u> almost instantaneous – has actually been quite a gradual process.

You see, this is <u>not</u> the <u>first</u> time that Simon has met Jesus – It isn't even the first time that Jesus had invited them to follow Him – <u>or</u> the first time they'd gone with Him –

The <u>first</u> time was way back – just a couple of days after John the Baptist had been speaking about Jesus – John was talking to <u>his</u> disciples when he saw Jesus going by and he pointed Jesus out to them – and then 2 of <u>John's</u> disciples then went to spend the day with Jesus – <u>one</u> of these was Andrew – Andrew spent all day listening to Jesus and he was so excited with what he was hearing that he ran to get his brother – Simon – to tell <u>him</u> that he'd found the Messiah –

And Andrew took Simon to meet Jesus.

Then a while after this, John the Baptist had been put in prison, and Jesus went to live in Capernaum — Capernaum is a little fishing town on the shores of the Sea of Galilee — and as He was walking beside the sea one day, Jesus came across both Simon and Andrew again — Simon and Andrew were in the shallows casting their nets, and Jesus called out to them, 'Come, follow Me,' He said —

And they both went with Jesus – as did James and John, 2 more fishermen that were there and they all spent quite a time with Jesus – listening to Him teach – watching Him heal – seeing Him cast out demons. They'd also been with Him, to that wedding at Cana – and seen what He'd done with the water in those great big stone jars.

They'd even had Jesus in their homes — Simon, had a house in Capernaum, almost opposite the Synagogue and Jesus had often visited there after teaching in the Synagogue. And on one occasion He'd actually <u>healed</u> Simon's mother-in-law.

But then for some reason, they'd all drifted back to fishing – and to trying to earn a living again.

Now I don't know about you, but I can think of a few people that I've known who've done something similar —

They've been so close to Jesus and they've seen Him do amazing things in their own lives and even do amazing things through them – and then for some unknown reason, they've drifted away – and given it all up – and they've gone back to how they used to be – and done the things that they used to do –

And so Simon and Andrew, James and John have gone back to how they used to be – and they've gone back to fishing –

And so here they are – after an absolutely <u>fruitless</u> night at fishing – here they are, cleaning their empty nets – just getting rid of the seaweed and debris that's got tangled in them – and half listening to Jesus as He teaches on the shore.

And Jesus was getting hemmed in – all around as the people crowded round Him and He had no-where else to go but backwoods – into the water—or, as it turns out – on the water –

or to be more precise – in a boat – or to be even more precise – into Simon's boat –

And v3 tells us that Jesus asked Simon to go out a little from the shore and then when Jesus had made Himself comfortable, He carried on teaching –

People would have heard Him better from out there as sound travels better over water, doesn't it?

Then v4 tells us that Jesus asked Simon to go further out — into the <u>deep</u> water — and to let down his nets for a catch —

Now, it's well into the day by now – probably hot too – and fish are mainly active in the cool of the night – that's why they fish at night – but there weren't any last night – their nets had been empty of fish –

And so you can almost feel Simon's frustration, can't you? – he just wants to get home to rest before going out again later but here's Jesus wanting to go fishing in the heat of the day – when the fish would all have been hiding in the <u>depths</u> of the sea –

And so he tells Jesus that he's tried all night and got nothing – but he seems to respect Jesus enough to humour Him, doesn't he? 'If you say so – then I will.' Simon says, and he gathers up all the nets again – even though it'll mean cleaning them all over again – and he piles them into his boat and puts out on the Sea of Galilee –

And we all know what happens next don't we?

There's this utterly unprecedented catch of fish! No-one's seen anything like it!

Last night when the fish $\underline{\text{should}}$ have been there – there weren't any –

And now when the fish should <u>not</u> be there – the lake is <u>teaming</u> with fish.

Sometime in the 1980's I think it was – archaeologists found a boat that was dated from around the time of Jesus and this boat was about 26ft long, 7 and a half ft wide and 4 and a half feet deep – not a <u>small</u> rowing boat by any means –

In fact, it's said that the <u>average</u> boat from back then could easily have been up to 30ft long.

Can you imagine just how much fish a boat like that would hold? 26 ft long – 7 and a half ft wide and 4 and a half ft deep!

And not just <u>one</u> boat full but 2 boats so full they began to sink –

But do you know, this is <u>not</u> about the fish?

It's more about who this man Jesus is!

And what it would mean to follow Him! -

For Simon, the past year or so is starting to fall into place — and the penny is starting to drop — perhaps this man really <u>is</u> the Messiah — just like his brother Andrew had said about a year ago —

And in v 8 we read that he falls at Jesus' knees! -

'Go away from me,' he says, 'for I am a sinful man.'

It's as if, not only does Simon Peter see who <u>Jesus</u> really is – but he also sees himself – as <u>he</u> really is –

But Jesus knows all about Simon Peter <u>and</u> his past, whatever that was – and He still calls him.

You see following Jesus is not about our past — it's about our future — and taking that first step towards that future.

And our first steps are exactly the same as Simon's – to see who <u>Jesus</u> really is and to see ourselves as we really are – and to realise that we can't save ourselves – Jesus is the only One who can help us –

We can only go so far on our own and in our own strength — we need Jesus — Simon Peter needed Jesus and he found that Jesus cared about his day-to-day routine — and He understood his needs — and it's the same for us —

Jesus cares about every little, and not so little, aspect of our lives – the things that we do – that we're involved in – the situations that we go through – the relationships that we're part of –

and so Simon falls at Jesus knees – as he's overcome with the awe and wonder of it all.

And what does Jesus do?

He <u>re</u>-calls Simon – He gives Simon a 2^{nd} chance to follow Him –

'Don't be afraid,' Jesus says, 'from now on you will catch men.'

And so we come to the verse that we started with –

'So they pulled their boats up on shore, left everything and followed Him.'

They <u>left</u> everything – and that wasn't just a few bits and bobs –

It was more like winning first prize in a roll-over- Lottery but not cashing in the ticket!

They left all that fish and the income it would have made – they left it all there – in the boats – on the shore – and they went off with Jesus!

And they never looked back – they spent the rest of the time with Jesus –

But Simon Peter had yet another hiccup, didn't he?

Before Jesus was crucified, he denied even knowing Jesus – never mind being one of His disciples!

And after the resurrection of Jesus – Simon Peter and the others, went back to fishing <u>again</u> –

But Jesus <u>found</u> them – and He gave them yet <u>another</u> chance to follow Him –

You see, Jesus is the God of the 2nd, the 3rd and the 103rd chances –

Because He never gives up on us -

Whatever our past is — we can leave it behind over and over again and make that fresh start over and over again with Jesus —

This story today is not about the fish – as miraculous as that was – it's about Jesus!

And about leaving our <u>past</u> behind and following Jesus –

It doesn't matter whether it's our 1st time, 2nd time, 3rd time or 103rd time that Jesus has called us – because you see, Jesus still wants us on His team –

He still Has a plan and a purpose for each one of us -

<u>None</u> of us is ever redundant, or unwanted – or even retired – Following Jesus is forever –

And we can make that fresh start with Him over and over again.

If you have a past that you need to leave behind then can I suggest that you do that today —

Just like Simon and Andrew, James and John did –

And can I suggest that you walk into the future with Jesus.

This story is not about the miracle of the fish -

It's about leaving our past behind –

And about committing our future to Jesus --
